I have designed and taught three Taiwan-focused courses, including "course name" and a graduate seminar on "course name." The university is committed to establishing a dedicated faculty position focused on Taiwan Studies. The appointed scholar will receive institutional support to lead a range of Taiwan-related academic initiatives on campus, including the development of new courses, the organization of symposia and lecture series, and the facilitation of interdisciplinary research collaborations.

In addition to this faculty position, the Department of Asian Studies will provide teaching relief, research assistant support, and logistical assistance for academic events. The university library will expand its Taiwan-related holdings and collaborate on digital resource development.

Looking ahead, the university plans to establish a Taiwan Studies Center as a long-term mechanism to ensure the sustainability of Taiwan-related research and teaching. This center will serve as a hub for academic exchange, community engagement, and international collaboration.

Institutionally, the Office of Global Partnerships will support formal agreements with academic institutions in Taiwan. Discussions are currently underway with the Formosa Academy of Social Sciences and National Formosan University to initiate joint research projects, student exchange programs, and co-organized events that will continue beyond the grant period.

In the long term, the project aims to institutionalize Taiwan Studies at Redwood through the establishment of a Taiwan Studies Research Center and a formalized minor program. These efforts will ensure continuity beyond the grant period, foster long-term interinstitutional collaboration, and contribute meaningfully to the global visibility and academic development of Taiwan Studies.

This three-year work plan lays the foundation for positioning Eastwood University as a regional leader in Taiwan Studies through the strategic integration of teaching, research, and international collaboration. The project will not only introduce Taiwan-focused academic content into the curriculum, but also establish structural mechanisms that ensure the field's long-term growth and global visibility.

Year 1: Develop and teach "Introduction to Taiwanese Culture," establish collaboration with National TW University, and begin literature review on postcolonial identity in Taiwan.

Year 2: Offer a graduate seminar "Taiwan in Global Context," conduct fieldwork in Taipei and Kaohsiung, and submit one journal article.

Year 3: Organize a Taiwan Studies symposium, publish research findings, and propose a new Taiwan Studies track within the East Asian Studies program.
